NIHR Academic Clinical Fellowship

Public Health ST1 (ST2/ST3)

The University of Sheffield, in partnership with NHS England has developed an exciting pathway of academic clinical training opportunities which for the first time in 2026 includes a public health academic training pathway open to both clinical and non-clinical applicants.

Applications are now invited for an Academic Clinical Fellowship in Public Health at ST1-3 level. This new post has been created as part of the NHS England (NHSE)/National Institution for Health Research (NIHR) programme of Integrated Academic Training and offers candidates a comprehensive experience of clinical academic training, working alongside internationally renowned clinicians, researchers and public health specialists.

Please note:- Applicants looking for an ST2 and ST3 post are encouraged to apply to this vacancy at ST1. If successful your experience will be assessed upon commencing in post enabling you to work at the appropriate level.

We are seeking highly motivated, enthusiastic individuals with the potential to excel in both their service and academic training and who have the ambition to be part of the next generation of academic public health specialists.

This Academic Clinical Fellowship (ACF) programme in Public Health will be run by the Sheffield Centre for Health & Related Research (SCHARR), University of Sheffield and the NHS England East Midlands Public Health Regional Training Programme

Academic Clinical Fellowships (ACFs) are 3 year fixed-term national training posts. They attract an NTN(A) and trainees undertake 75% service and 25% academic training over the term of the post. They are employed through the regional training programme and have an honorary contract with the University at which their academic research is supported.

ACF trainees also undertake a Research Training Programme provided by the University for which funding is provided by NIHR. They also are eligible for a £1,000 bursary per year to support research training activity (e.g to attend academic conferences).

The Clinical Academic Programme at Sheffield has a competitive ACF pump-priming award. Trainees can apply for up to £2000 for initial costs for work aimed at achieving a research fellowship.

ACF trainees would also normally complete and submit an external funding application for a research fellowship to enable them to complete a higher degree (PhD or research MD) following the completion of their ACF fixed-term post, which would be completed as Out-of-Programme-Research (OOPR).

All Academic Clinical Fellowships are run-through posts, regardless of specialty, with the exception of 'Medical Education' ACFs. A trainee entering ACF at ST1 in a specialty with a Core Training period would therefore be guaranteed continued training to CCT in the eventual specialty, as long as they progress satisfactorily through both their academic and clinical training. Run-through status is withdrawn if ACFs do not complete the academic component.

POST DETAILS

Job Title

NIHR Academic Clinical Fellow (ACF) - Public Health

Duration of the Post

Up to 3 years (25% academic, 75% service).

Research institution in which training will take place

The Sheffield Centre for Health and Related Research (SCHARR)

Based in the School of Medicine and Population Health at the University of Sheffield, SCHARR brings together a wide range of health-related skills including health economics, operational research, management sciences, epidemiology and public health, medical statistics, and information science. SCHARR is comprised of the sections of Health Economics and Decision Science, Health Services Research, Design Trials and Statistics, and Public Health.

In the 2022 Research Excellence Framework (REF) 91% of SCHARR research was rated as world-leading or internationally excellent, and the SCHARR impact submission was rated 6th nationally. SCHARR employs about 200 multidisciplinary staff and attracts around £10 million per year in external research support. SCHARR is ideally placed to conduct applied and methodological health services research, and teaching programmes, having a great diversity of skills and experience and close contacts with the Department of Health and NHS organisations.

Section of Public Health

The post holder will be attached to the section of Public Health within SCHARR. The Section leads a number of research themes and major research programmes. More information is available on the SCHARR webpages:

Opportunities in Public Health Research

Sheffield is a leading national and international centre for applied public health research and has particularly strong collaborative links across other academic faculties and disciplines. We lead a research theme in the university's cross-faculty Healthy Lifespan Institute (HELSI) on "Health & Place" and are a partner in the national NIHR School of Public Health Research, the NIHR PHIRST Fusion team and HDRC Doncaster, led by the City of Doncaster Council.

Research Protected Time:

The post will be split so that 9 months (25%) are spent undertaking research-related activities and 27 months (75%) in service work.

Academic Clinical Fellowship Training Programme: Research Component

The research component will be based in SCHARR (https://www.sheffield.ac.uk/cure), where the fellow will be supervised by one of the Professors in Public Health and will have access to methodological expertise in all aspects of public health research.

The fellow will have the opportunity to complete the SCHARR MPH (if they do not already have an MPH qualification or equivalent). This provides training in quantitative and qualitative research design and analysis, with opportunities for more advanced training in statistics, economic evaluation, and qualitative research. The fellow will also undertake a research project aimed at achieving peer-reviewed publication and conference presentation, with the potential to form the basis of a funded doctoral fellowship application. Research projects typically involve analysis of routine data, collection of pilot data, or evidence synthesis.

SCHARR has an excellent track record of supporting doctoral fellowship applications and extensive support for ACFs intending to apply for a doctoral fellowship.

Academic Clinical Fellowship Training Programme: Service Component

Alongside academic training, the fellow will be based on service training locations to complete their public health training including local authority and other public health organisations (DHSC/OHID, UKHSA, NHS England)

SPECIALTY POSTS

The Public Health Fellow would have the opportunities to work with other relevant clinical medical specialties during their training, including Infectious Diseases, Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Paediatrics and other clinical specialities, many of which undertake public health and health services research.

Post Details

JOB TITLE: NIHR Academic Clinical Fellowship in Public Health Medicine

BRIEF OUTLINE:

The programme is designed to provide training from either ST1 or ST3 level for a period of 3 years. Further details for the East Midlands training programme are provided in the attached Training Programme information and from the School of Public health https://eastmidlandsdeanery.nhs.uk/welcome-school-public-health-2.

Objectives of the Training Programme:

- 1. To undertake public health training with ongoing progression available for completion of specialist training in public health.
- 2. To undertake relevant training in public health research and knowledge mobilisation methods.
- 3. To identify an area of research interest upon which to base an application for an externally funded PhD programme.

Successful candidates:

The exit from this post will typically be to an externally funded research fellowship, leading to the award of a PhD and subsequently application either for a Public Health lecturer post or a post-doctoral fellowship.

Unsuccessful candidates:

If the post-holder does not achieve the expected competencies, this will be handled in the same way as for all other trainees in public health.

If the post-holder fails to achieve academic competencies or is unsuccessful in obtaining research funding, they would be anticipated to return to a clinical training post. This will be discussed in good time with the Training Programme Director (TPD) through the system for appraisal and mentoring of academic trainees. Whilst no guarantee of an appropriate post is possible, every effort will be made to accommodate such individuals within the local training schemes.
