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Our Speakers



Dr Kate Lovett — ‘Psychiatry Training for the Future’

Kate is the Dean and is the chief academic officer of the College. She is elected for the period 2016–2021.

Dr Kate Lovett studied Medicine at the Universities of St. Andrews and Manchester. Having been awarded a Distinction in Psychiatry at finals, Kate trained as a Psychiatrist in the Northwest obtaining the MRCPsych in 1995. She completed an MSc in Clinical Psychiatry in 1997 researching the role of ovarian steroids in postnatal depression. Kate trained both full time and flexibly completing specialist training in 2001.

She has worked for Devon Partnership Trust as a Consultant Psychiatrist in General Adult Psychiatry since 2001 as an inpatient and crisis consultant. She was an Associate Medical Director between 2008 and 2010 and has been in her current role as a community psychiatrist for the past 5 years.

Dr James Johnson — ‘Help: a psychiatrist begins psychotherapy. Animation about help for both patient and doctor.’

Dr James Johnston MA FRCPsych has worked as a Consultant Psychiatrist in Medical Psychotherapy in Leeds since 1997. He integrates psychoanalytic psychotherapy in psychiatry as a medical psychotherapist and he helps to develop psychotherapeutic medicine and psychiatry at undergraduate and postgraduate levels.

He trained as a Psychoanalytic Psychotherapist with the North of England Association of Psychoanalytic Psychotherapists and is currently training as a psychoanalyst with the British Psychoanalytical Society.

He was appointed Chair of the Royal College of Psychiatrists’ Medical Psychotherapy Faculty Education and Curriculum Committee 2011- 2015. In this role he consolidated psychotherapy training in psychiatry, established new dual medical psychotherapy trainings and began the UK wide establishment of medical student psychotherapy and Balint schemes for the Royal College of Psychiatrists from 2014 to date.

He is an artist and uses his art work to teach about psychotherapy and psychiatry, drawing from life.



Mary-Ann Bruce — ‘Thoughts on Learning from Deaths.’

Mary-Ann Bruce RGN, RSCN, RHV, MBA, originally trained as general and sick children’s nurse in Westminster, London. She then moved north as a staff nurse, trained as a Health Visitor and moved into community services management in the North East. She managed a wide range of community services including Mental Health and Learning Disability teams.

From there Mary-Ann joined the Audit Commission for 10 years and worked as a specialist performance auditor working with boards across the North. She led nationally on studies undertaken by the Audit Commission. This brought her in to contact with inspection work and she took the lead for Health workstreams in local government inspection

programmes across the North and then whole county public sector inspection programmes in Worcestershire, Warwickshire and Herefordshire, working with Ofsted, CQC, HMI Prisons, HMI Constabulary, HM Inspectorate for Probation services and the Fire Services regulator. She then became Head of Healthcare Advisory for the Audit Commission and later moved to Mazars LLP as Head of Health in 2012. For the last seven years she has led the Mazars healthcare team.

Mary-Ann authored the report into Southern Health NHS Foundation Trust looking at all Mental Health and Learning Disability deaths which was published by NHS England in December 2015. She sat on the CQC Expert Advisory Group subsequently commissioned by the Secretary of State, which published Learning, Candour and Accountability. This led directly to the Learning from Deaths guidance issued in March 2017. She works with Trusts across the country to support their mortality assurance processes and undertakes independent investigations into complex cases.
